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Local Birding Hotspots

North Etiwanda Preserve

On February 17, 2011 I had the opportunity to make a visit to the North Etiwanda Preserve after I dropped the kids off at their perspective schools. I wasn't sure how to get there, especially since the 210 freeway has gone in. It used to be that all you had to do was go straight up Etiwanda Avenue from Baseline to get to the Day Creek area. Now, the best way to get to the preserve is to take the 210 freeway and take the Day Creek exit and go north. Day Creek then curves to the east; follow it until the street ends at Etiwanda Avenue. Turn left and within half a mile you are there.

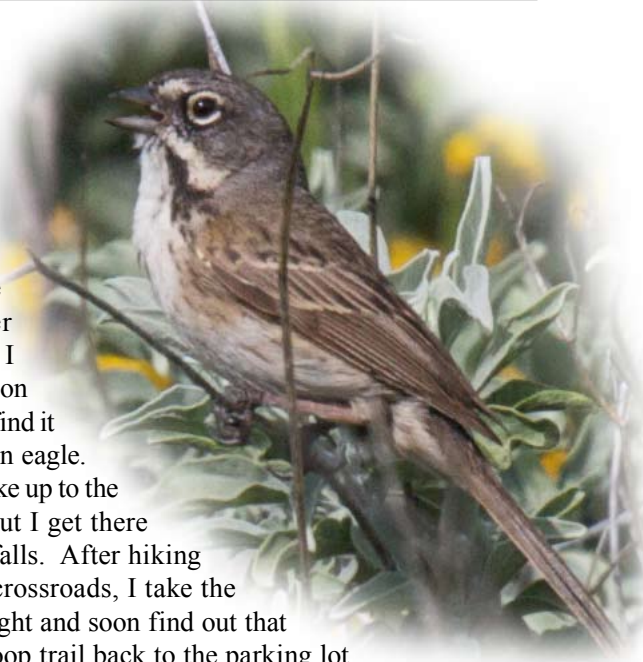
As I was pulling past the big sign for the North Etiwanda Preserve a Say's Phoebe fly past and I was hopeful for a good morning of birding. I parked my car in the dirt parking lot by the entrance and walked up to check out the map of the preserve posted by the entrance. I walked up the trail to the left and was hearing California Thrashers from the start. After seeing a couple of the thrashers sitting atop bushes singing away, I moved farther up the trail and spotted a singing rock wren, then a couple steps farther along I see the bird I was hoping to see here, the sage sparrow singing. It then takes off and seemingly chases the rock wren away from its territory. After that I start hearing and seeing the sage sparrows all over the place. Soon I come up to the visitors kiosk and check out the nice displays of flora, fauna and history of this area. It is really well done. From the kiosk I hear a bird calling that I don't recognize right away and set off to find the bird. It turns out to be a rufous-crowned sparrow, another good bird find. Soon I come to a fork in the trail and I take the trail going right because I hear the sound of rushing water and chorusing frogs. I come to the top of a bluff overlooking what I'm guessing is wild Day Creek. There is a large flock of western bluebirds sitting quietly on bare branches of a dead tree, and I soon find out why they are quiet. Not twenty feet further down the trail is a Cooper's Hawk sitting in a tree waiting for something to move. That trail dead ends at a display of indian culture in the area, so I turn around and head up the trail going to the waterfall that is up the canyon. As I am going up the canyon I am hearing wrentits and more sage sparrows. Then

I see a huge silhouette soaring over the foothills, I put my noes on the bird and find it to be a golden eagle.

It is a long hike up to the waterfalls, but I get there and see the falls. After hiking back to the crossroads, I take the trail going right and soon find out that it is a long loop trail back to the parking lot.

More hike than I wanted to do that day, so I turn around and back track to the trail I had originally taken. On the way back to my car I see a flock of Violet-green Swallows and then perhaps the best bird of the day (only because they are becoming increasingly difficult to find) a loggerhead shrike.

All told for the day I saw 28 species of birds in two and a half hours birding time. This place is a real diamond in the rough and I would recommend to anyone to go to the North Etiwanda Preserve.



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Oak Park Cemetery

Oak Park Cemetery is located in south Claremont between Mills Ave. and Sycamore Ave. with an entrance off Sycamore at East Oak Park Drive. The Cemetery is open during daylight hours and contains two areas, the Cemetery proper and an undeveloped area to the north. The Cemetery is well vegetated with flowering Eucalyptus, Cherry and a variety of evergreens and palms, while the northern area is mostly oak and sycamore plus weedy field. In winter the cemetery has had gray flycatcher, varied thrush, and black and white warbler along with yellow rumps and resident white-breasted nuthatch and visiting chipping sparrows. Migration is prime time at the cemetery, especially in the northern undeveloped area where most western migrants have been observed, including lots of buntings and sparrows in the grassy areas. The cemetery is a quiet area for a leisurely walk along the paved roads. Be respectful of any funerals and let us know what birds you find.

Ely Basins

This is a very good place to view ducks and shorebirds when winter rain runoff flows into the three basins. Late November, December and January are usually good months. Here you may see hundreds of American wigeons, mallards, northern shovelers, cinnamon teal and green-winged teal. Northern pintail, ring-necked ducks, canvasbacks, blue-winged teal and redheads can also be seen there. For several years now a male Eurasian wigeon has been found with the American wigeons. Other birds seen are black-necked stilt, long-billed dowitcher, great egret, greater yellowlegs, spotted sandpiper, and occasionally osprey, green heron, belted kingfisher and Bonaparte's gull.

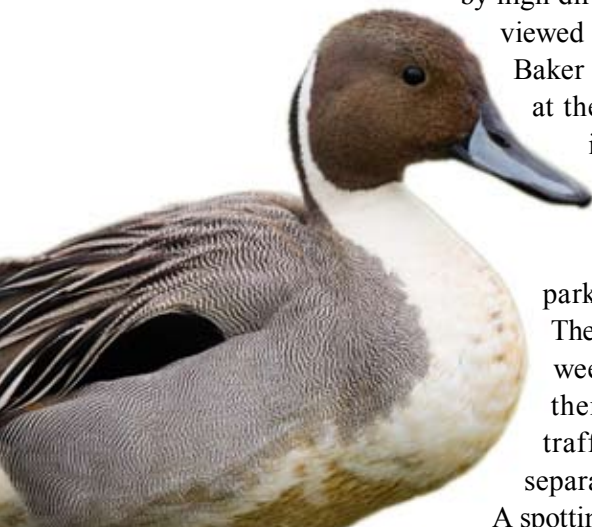
The basins are located along the 1500 to 2000 block on the north side of Philadelphia Street in Ontario. They are fenced and surrounded

by high dirt berms and can only be viewed from the cross streets of Baker Ave. and Vineyard Ave.

at the bridge railings. There is an industrial park on the north side of the eastern most pond and you can drive into their parking area to view birds.

The best time to visit is on the weekends; during the week there is very heavy truck traffic and no sidewalks to separate you from the traffic.

A spotting scope is a must.

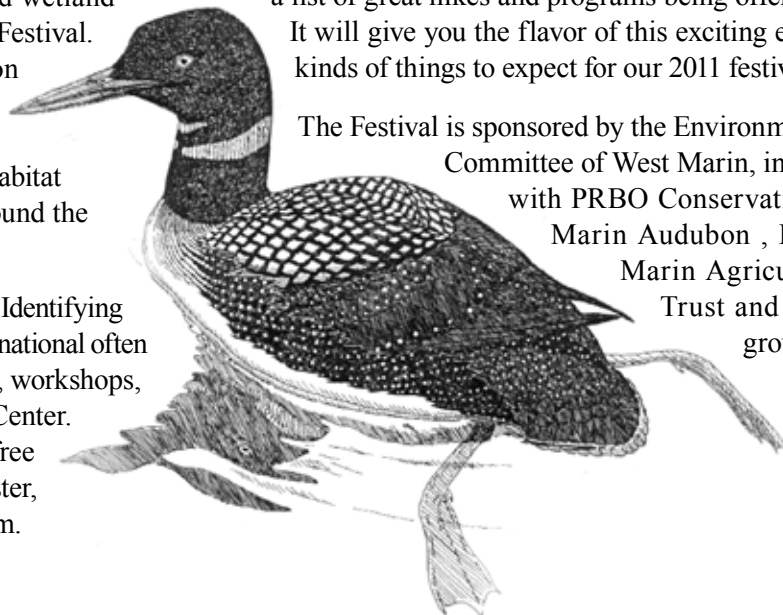

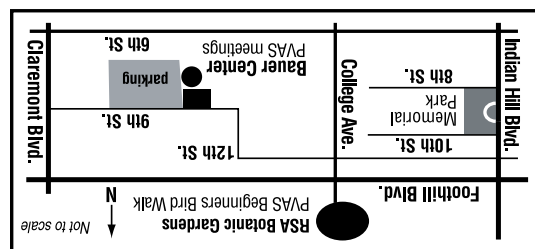
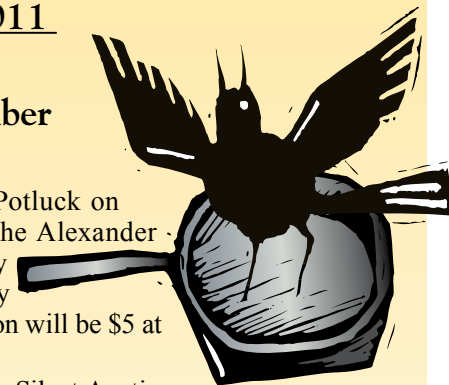
PVAS Annual
